

GENERAL RULES & INFORMATION ALL EXHIBITORS MUST READ

Entry Forms and Fees Due By Tuesday, Aug 6th 2024. Fair Office Open Aug 6th from 5pm to 7:30pm only.

- 1. The grounds, buildings, and exhibits will be under the management of the Fair Association. The management will not be responsible for the loss of an article or damage that may occur. The management will take every precaution for the safe preservation of all livestock and articles on exhibition and all property of every character entered for competition or display and subject to the control of the management, but in no way will the management be responsible for any loss of or damage of, or injury of any character, to any such property while same is on the grounds, or at any time or place. Property owners or others interested in protection against loss, damage, or injury from fire or other causes must make their own arrangements.
- 2. Youth Exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fair. While adults can provide verbal instruction, NO physical assistance shall be given. Exhibitors are fully responsible for their animals and may look to other exhibitors for assistance where needed.
- 3. All exhibitors will be held liable for any and all damage(s) done by the exhibitor, dependent(s), or animal entry/entries.
- 4. If rules and regulations are violated, all awards will be forfeited.
- 5. Judging will be done by using the Danish System furnished by the Fair Assoc. Judge's decisions will be final.
- 6. No Late entries will be accepted.
- 7. The superintendent of each department has final say over his/her department.
- 8. All exhibit space will be assigned to the exhibitor by the Superintendent of that department.
- 9. Fair buildings close at 8:00 pm. Grounds close at 10:00 pm. PLEASE NOTE: Youth exhibitors are permitted to remain on the grounds after 10:00 pm, they must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.
- 10. Entry tags with awards should be displayed.
- 11. Only blue ribbon winners qualify for champion awards.
- 12. Any person may enter in any division according to the rules of the Clayton Community Fair. Adults will be in Open class. Youth will enter in their appropriate class: Club or Open. You must choose one.
- 13. Only qualified persons in judging area.
- 14. NO SMOKING or VAPING on the Fairgrounds EXCEPT in DESIGNATED AREA.
- 15. Premiums will be paid only to youth exhibitors according to points or amount stated for each division.
- 16. Any rosette ribbons that are destroyed must be replaced at the expense of the exhibitor.
- 17. ALL FIRE LANES MUST BE KEPT OPEN AT ALL TIMES, violators will be towed at own expense.
- 18. ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE NOT ALLOWED ON FAIRGROUNDS.
- 19. Still life Barns close Sunday at 3pm, exhibits released at 4pm (must be picked up by 5:30pm. Unclaimed items available for pick-up the following Tuesday 6:30pm-7:00pm.). Livestock Barns start clean up at 3pm Sunday.
- 20. No pets allowed. Service dogs are welcome with proper paperwork and behavior.
- 21. All entries need to be correct, complete, and legible.
- 22. Club leaders or Parents must sign youth entries. Adults must sign open entries.
- 23. Exhibitors are to pick up stall cards from Barn superintendent.
- 24. Additional fairbooks and entry forms will be available online and at the fair office.
- 25. Exhibitor shall be the person whose name appears on the entry blank.
- 26. Trophies for top exhibitor in each dept will be on the basis of blue ribbon points. In the case of a tie, Grand and Reserve Champion ribbons will be awarded by barn superintendent.
- 27. Fair tickets must be purchased at the gate to enter the event.
- 28. Department Superintendent must check out all exhibits or no premiums will be awarded.
- 29. No vehicles on the grounds without a fair-issued pass.

<u>Disruptive Behavior</u> is any behavior which endangers the perpetrator or others, inter-feres with fair business or other patrons, volunteers, staff, or is illegal. This may include any activity which results in harm to fair equipment or services. A patron who is disrup- tive will be notified of inappropriate behavior. If behavior continues, the patron will be asked to leave. If patron refuses to leave, local law enforcement will be called. Disrup- tive behavior may result in suspension of privileges to be at the fairgrounds for a length of time to be determined by the board.



ANIMAL EXHIBIT RULES

- 1. All exhibitors participating in livestock sale must live in the Deer Park, Mead, Springdale, Riverside, Nine Mile Falls, Loon Lake or Valley School District Boundaries.
- 2. Entry Fees: Each class entered will have a fee. Large animals \$4 per lot (Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Horse). Small animals \$2 per lot (Rabbit, Dog, Cats, Pocket Pets, Poultry).
- 3. Youth Exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fair. While adults can provide verbal instruction, NO physical assistance shall be given. Exhibitors are fully responsible for their animals and may look to other exhibitors for assistance where needed.
- 4. There will be no hauling of Bovine and Sheep / Goats in the same trailer at the same time.
- 5. All stalling or penned animals must pass vet check and be in place by 8pm Thursday.
- 6. No contagious diseases, IE- ringworm, warts, pinkeye, strangles, scabies, lice, mites, fleas, erythema, ETC.
- 7. No out-of-state entries will be accepted.
- 8. There will be a licensed veterinarian on call during the fair.
- 9. No injecting, drenching, or drugging of any animal unless under veterinarian care and supervision.
- 10. No Late entries will be accepted.
- 11. Premiums will be forfeited if you fail to check out with dept superintendent.
- 12. All animal exhibitors must help with setup, tear down, and cleanup.
- 13. No blanketing of animals during fair hours, unless approved by superintendent.
- 14. Only one grand and one reserve champion award will be given to each breed.
- 15. All animals and feed must remain in their designated area.
- 16. Feeding of animals only where designated, no feeding allowed in cooling stations.
- 17. Each exhibitor must furnish feed and proper care for their animal. Neglect will result in the forfeiture of premiums.
- 18. Any abuse or mistreatment of any animal can result in forfeited premiums and removal from fair.
- 19. Herdsmanship and Fitting & Showing are mandatory. Premiums paid to Fitting & Showing youth only.
- 20. Shavings and/or Straw will be provided by the fair association.
- 21. Exhibitors of hooved livestock must own or be in possession of the animal at least 90 days before fair, except market steers which shall be 120 days.
- 22. Owners of registered animals must furnish cert. of reg. upon request.
- 23. PLEASE REFER TO WEB SITE **claytoncommunityfair.com** FOR AUCTION SUPPORT FORMS AND QUALITY ASSURANCE FORMS.
- 24. Each exhibitor shall be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss. Injury or damage done to, occasioned by, or arising from any animal, shown by the exhibitor, and the exhibitor will indemnify the management against all legal proceedings thereto.
- 25. Each exhibitor must read department-specific rules prior to entry.
- 26. All exhibitors must display an educational poster.
- 27. All market sheep and market goats must have scrapies tags and ALL swine RFID tags.
- 28. All animals may be subject to drug testing this can include blood and hair.

Bovine Requirements

All domestic bovine animals (including bison), except those for immediate slaughter at a federally inspected establishment, shall be accompanied by a health certificate and shall meet the following requirements.

- 1. **Tuberculosis:** All beef and dairy cattle must originate from herds not under quarantine in a not less than modified accredited area.
- 2. **Brucellosis:** Cattle originating from states other than Washington: All domestic bovine animals (including bison) shall be moved on a permit issued by the Animal Health Division of the Department of Agriculture, an official interstate health certificate, and shall meet the following requirements: All cattle must be negative to an official Brucellosis test conducted within forty-five days prior to date of entry to the fair, except the following classes of cattle.

These cattle are exempt from the test requirement:

- 1. Calves under six months of age.
- 2. Steers and heifers.
- 3. Cattle officially vaccinated for Brucellosis. An official tattoo must be visible in the right ear.
- 4. Immediate slaughter cattle going directly to a federally inspected slaughter establishment.
- 5. We recommend that cattle over three months of age receive 7-way vaccinations.

HAEMOPHILUS-BRVS-11BR- P13BDV: this is available in one vaccine and administered in two doses.

Fitting and Showing Contest

The purpose of a showmanship contest is to create more interest in, and better knowledge of proper fitting, training, and showing of animals. Market and feeder animals may participate.

All training and preparation of the animals during the show are to be done by the contestants. Each contestant must show his

Basis of Awards

- 1. Preparation of an animal
 - a. Condition of feet
 - b. Cleanliness and grooming
 - Condition of coat, Hair free from scurf and dirt (score down for excess oil and use of objectionable materials)
 - Hair and fleece free from briars, chaff, dung locks etc.
 - Preparation of hair and fleece in accordance with breed standards.
- 2. Showing of animal
 - a. Appearance of exhibitor
 - Official attire- button-up shirt or blouse, no holes in jeans, proper footwear, jacket if appropriate. Stud earrings only and no necklaces. Hair should be pulled back, out of face.
 - Control of animal by exhibitor
 - Poise and coolness of exhibitor
- 3. Skills in showing, including
 - Continuous attention to judge
 - Keeping animal placed to advantage
 - Ability to stand or move animal as requested by judge.
- 4. Fleshing or Condition:
 - Thickness, distribution and texture of flesh.

THIS IS A JR. SHOW: Exhibitors are on their OWN. They are competing with each other for placing and recognition of their ability and initiative to present their animals to the judges and the public. PARENTS AND OTHER ADULTS ARE TO REFRAIN FROM THE PREPARATION OF LIVESTOCK WHILE AT THE SHOW. This show could not exist without the wonderful cooperation of all of the parents and others, however, the actual work at the show must be done by the exhibitor. If help is needed, exhibitors are encouraged to ask another exhibitor. One warning will be issued if adults are helping. The second occurrence forfeits premiums.

There will be one overall champion in each species chosen by the judge. At the judge's discretion, an overall may be chosen without bringing the top showman for each group back into the ring. This can happen particularly in times of heat and out of concern for animal safety and health. Judge and Superintendent are to have the final say.

Only exhibitors allowed in barns at the time of showing. Adults & parents may mentor from outside the show area. They may not touch the animals.

Large and Small Animal Round Robin Contest Saturday of fair at 12 pm

Overall youth Grand Champion Fitting and Showing Showman must compete with their own animal (unless there are veterinary or safety concerns). Only one showman per department. If Grand Champion does not show because eligible in more than one department, then the Reserve Champion may compete. Only Grand or Reserve Champions are eligible. If Grand chooses not to show for any reason, he or she forfeits that award for that department(s). Each department will supply one judge. Contestants will be judged on their ability to handle, show, and answer species questions for points. If a contestant chooses not to handle an animal for any reason the Judge may ask questions on showing techniques for points. However, they would receive no points for handling.

Meet Us At The JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE

Our Livestock Sale will feature outstanding livestock raised by our local youth. The Code of Ethics of Raising and Selling Livestock will be strictly followed.

PURPOSE OF SALE

- 1. To guarantee an outlet for our local youths' market project animals.
- 2. Offer businesses or individuals the opportunity to show support and recognition for youth efforts to raise quality market animals.
- 3. This is a terminal sale, no animals will be returned to the exhibitors.

BUYERS

Any interested person or business may bid on any animal during the auction. You may bid as an individual or as part of a group on particular animals. If you, your firm, or organization cannot attend the sale but wish to participate, you can do so by proxy. Change of ownership of animals sold will tentatively take place after the sale on Saturday.

HOW THE SALE IS CONDUCTED

There is a clerk for the sale to whom each buyer must present his/her name and address before the sale and receive a number. Arrangements for payment can be made at this time or following the sale. The bidding must begin at the market price of lambs, hogs, or beef as set the Friday before the auction. The amount of money bid above the market price is called support money. Top animals will be auctioned first in each category.

If your bid wins the animal, you have a choice of paying the total bid price and keeping the animal for your own use, or of paying the support money only and turning the animal.

EXAMPLE:

Suppose we have a 120 lb. market lamb. Market price is \$1.50 per lb., or \$180.00 for the lamb; final bid price is \$2.25 per lb., or \$270.00 The difference between market price and the bid final price is \$90.00, which is deemed support money for the youth exhibitor. As a buyer, you can pay \$270.00 and keep the animal for butcher or pay \$90.00 and turn the animal over to the stock buyer. With either choice, you receive recognition and advertisement as the buyer of the animal.

THE SUPPORT MONEY YOU PAY MAY BE TAX DEDUCTIBLE

Besides blue and red ribbon sheep, hogs, beef, and market goats, the auction will include the grand and reserve pens of 3 fryer chickens and 3 meat rabbits.

Sale sponsored by Deer Park Fair Association/Clayton Community Fair JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

Eligibility:

- 1. Must live in the Deer Park, Mead, Springdale, Riverside, Nine Mile Falls, Loon Lake, or Valley school district boundaries.
- 2. Must be a 4-H or FFA Member or have a current YQCA certification at check-in.
- 3. Must be registered as a youth exhibitor and be 9 years old at time of fair.
- 4. Each exhibitor must own the animal for the required number of days to meet the rules of ownership.
- 5. All market animals must turn in complete and legible quality assurance forms at weigh-in. (Including Poultry and Rabbit Meat Pens) QA forms on the website (claytoncommunityfair.com)
- 6. Steers need a haul slip with exhibitor's name & brand inspection if already branded at weigh-in.

THERE WILL BE NO HAULING OF BOVINE AND GOATS/SHEEP IN THE SAME TRAILER AT THE SAME TIME.

Veterinarian will inspect animals before they are unloaded on Thursday evening or as needed.

- 1. Each qualifying exhibitor may sell one market animal total.
- 2. Animals must meet the limits for Market Livestock Classes:
 - o Goats Min: 60 lbs. Max: 120 lbs. * Born after Aug. 1 of year prior
 - Steers Min: 1050 lbs. Max: 1500 lbs. * Born after Jan. 1 of year prior
 - o Lambs Min: 105 lbs. Max: 160 lbs. * Born after Dec. 1 of year prior
 - Hogs Min: 230 lbs. Max: 300 lbs. * Born after Jan. 15 of the current year
 - Rabbits Min: 3.5 lbs. Max: 5.5 lbs. * Be owned 30 days & be no older than 80 days.
 - Poultry Min: 4 lbs. Max: 4.5 lbs. Each * Be owned 30 days & be no older than 80 days.
 - Turkey Min: 16 lbs. Each * Be owned 30 days & be no older than 80 days.
 - Animals that do not meet weight limits will not sell at this auction.

It's advisable to leave tops approximately 2" long on crops such as beets, carrots, parsnips, turnips, and onions (do not peel onions). Potatoes should be of uniform, average size and free from all blemishes. Be sure potatoes are mature. Avoid rough handling and severe scrubbing.
- 9. Any entry which has lost its exhibit value due to decomposition or drying may be discarded at the discretion of the Superintendent.



HERDSMANSHIP

- 1. Good care of your animal and assigned exhibiting space is an important part of the privilege and responsibility of exhibitor. Because many more people see your animal in the barn than show ring, exhibitors are expected to maintain barn, feeding, and grooming conditions that will insure the good health and safety of the animals in their care, and will show consideration and sensitivity toward the public visiting. Exhibitors are expected to be available to the fair visitor to discuss their exhibit or project. Exhibitors are reminded that they are hosts/hostesses in their barn.
- 2. The public interest in animal welfare, and their opinion of the quality of care given to animals has become a critical issue.
- 3. Exhibitors are to perform their own Herdsmanship chores. Herdsmanship chores done by non-exhibitors can result in forfeit of all awards and premiums by the exhibitors involved.
- 4. Herdsmanship should not be competitive, it is a responsibility that comes with the privilege of participation and demonstrates personal pride and team support.
- 5. Each superintendent will ask for volunteer adults to monitor the actions of fairgoers, oversee the humane care of the animals and provide support for the exhibitors.
- 6. Barns and displays will be examined at least twice a day. Failure to maintain adequate standards will result in loss of premiums. Minimum maintenance includes maintaining a fresh water supply, feeding as needed, bedding pen/stall area, decorating the area, and minimal maintenance of aisle ways. The superintendent has the responsibility to determine appropriate assistance levels and may correct situations that go beyond minimal attention by non-exhibitors.
- 7. Please do not eat or drink while in the penning, stalling, or public areas in livestock and equine or poultry/rabbit barns. This applies to exhibitor and chaperone/parent, etc., and will be enforced by the Fair Association.
- 8. The Herdsmanship evaluation scores of 80-89 will earn red ribbons, while scores of 90-100 will earn blue ribbons. Scores lower than 80 will receive no ribbons placing and will result in loss of 20 points in the total premiums earned by each member of team or individual. One warning of inadequate Herdsmanship will be given. A no-placing penalty will be assigned at the next Herdsmanship examination if problems have not been corrected. Herdsmanship evaluation will be based on group and individual performance, and all exhibitors within each group will receive the same score.
- 9. Herdsmanship hours will be scheduled by departments and regular hours will be maintained. Also appropriate Herdsmanship dress is expected.

Horse


- · Animals attended while tied.


